Utah Valley is the perfect location for any type of group or family gathering for a variety of reasons. This is no doubt due to the affordability, variety of activities, location and ease of access to popular attractions, the overall friendly and fun vibe that exists here, and the incredibly scenic mountain backdrop.

First, Utah Valley is just 30 minutes south of the Salt Lake International Airport, making it a central location within a half-day's drive of fifteen national parks, monuments, and recreation areas - the largest concentration of such attractions in any state south of Alaska.

Second, with Mount Timpanogos and the Uinta National Forest to the east and Utah Lake to the west, there are plenty of recreational opportunities within very close proximity and easy access. Hiking, camping, fishing, mountain-biking, horseback riding, and water sports are favorite activities during the summer; while downhill skiing, cross-country skiing, sledding, snowmobiling, ice climbing, and hunting are popular during the winter. There are also numerous attractions throughout Utah Valley that make for fun times during the reunion for people of all ages and adventure types, regardless of the time of year you decide to visit.

Third, Utah Valley has a wide and unique range of event venues to hold your group or family reunion. Some of our most prominent venues are Robert Redford's Sundance Resort, Thanksgiving Point, Provo Marriott Hotel and Conference Center, Utah Valley University, Brigham Young University and the Utah Valley Convention Center (opening Spring 2012).

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State Parks

Utah Lake State Park

The 96,600-acre lake includes four boat ramps, a 30-acre sheltered marina, 78 seasonal/transient boat slips, and full support facilities. Enjoy water skiing, boating, fishing, and picnicking. Group camping is available. Five miles west of downtown Provo on Center Street, it is located at 4400 West Center Street. The park is open year-round. Reservations are accepted from April 15-October 15. There is a day-use fee of \$9 and a camping fee of \$20. For more information call (801) 375-0731.

Camp Floyd/Stagecoach Inn

This state park is the site of a former military post quartering the largest concentration of troops in the United States from 1858 to 1861. Nearby Stagecoach Inn was an overnight stop on the historic overland stage and Pony Express route. The park, open from April to October, includes a military cemetery and the restored Stagecoach Inn museum. Reservations are not accepted. There are picnic areas and a group pavilion available. The park is located 25 miles southwest of Lehi on State Route 73 at 18035 W. 1540 N. in Fairfield. For more information call (801) 768-8932.

Deer Creek Reservoir

Concrete boat ramp, boat rentals, and full support facilities make this seven-mile-long reservoir ideal for boating, water skiing, sailing, and wind surfing. Boating is available from May to November. Camping and picnicking facilities are also available. North of Provo on Hwy 189 near Heber City, Deer Creek is open for recreation year-round. Reservations are accepted from April 1 to October 1. There is a group pavilion available. The day-use fee is \$10 and camping fee is \$16-25. For more information call (435) 654-0171.

Jordanelle Reservoir

Just minutes north of Heber City on US Hwy 40, this 3,068 surface-acre reservoir provides the ideal setting for parties. The reservoir's sandy beaches, day-use cabanas and a children's play area are ideal for family gatherings. The Hailstone Recreation area features two separate boat ramps, an 80-slip marina with utility hookups, fuel dispensing, boat rentals, and a marina store and restaurant. Three separate campgrounds with showers and utility hookups are also available. The day-use fee is \$10 and camping fee is \$20. For more information call (435) 649-9540.

Wasatch Mountain

Year-round adventure awaits—golf, hike, bike, camp, horseback ride, snowmobile, cross country ski, and snowshoe at the Wasatch Mountain State Park. During warmer months, reserve a tee time at popular lake and mountain golf courses. In the winter, ski or snowmobile through the alpine terrain. The Wasatch Mountain State Park is located just minutes from Heber City, off of Hwy 189. The day-use fee is \$5, camping is not allowed. For more information call (435) 654-1791.

Camping

Utah County has many group campsites, located in the beautiful Uinta National Forest east of the Provo-Orem area. The following sites are those which accommodate 50 or more people. Smaller sites are also available. The U.S. Forest Service supervisor's office has a complete listing of all Uinta National Forest campgrounds (88 W. 100 N., Provo, UT 84601; (801) 342-5100. To make reservations (must be at least 5 days in advance), call the National Reservation System at 1-877-444-6777 or www.reserveusa.com. Please know the name of the campground, name of the forest, arrival and departure dates, and have a credit card ready for payment at the time of reservation.

Attractions

TOURS

HEBER VALLEY RAILROAD- operates one steam and four vintage diesel-electric locomotives. The railroad offers both round-trip and one-way trips through beautiful Provo Canyon, from Vivian Park in Provo Canyon to Heber City and back. One-way in either direction takes approximately 1½ hours. Round-trips, beginning at Vivian Park, are 3 hours in length. The train operates year-round, but the schedule changes depending on the season. The whole train can be chartered for special groups. Several Saturdays throughout the season, the Railroad offers Lakeside Trains, Barbeque Trains, and Murder Mystery Trains. There is a full-service refreshment car with every excursion.

OUTDOOR ADVENTURES

PROVO RIVER RAFTING- High Country Tours offers an exciting (not *too* wild) trip down the Provo River for people of all ages. The cost of a two-hour trip includes equipment and guides. Experience the beauty of Provo Canyon, highlighted by 11,800-foot Mount Timpanogos.

SUNDANCE- Robert Redford's resort is a unique combination of ski resort, year-round recreation area, and arts community. In addition to 450-acres of skiing terrain, Sundance offers a multitude of activities and recreation in a beautiful, outdoor setting nestled below the 11,800-foot Mount Timpanogos. Summer attractions include concerts, mountain biking, and outdoor films. Rent all of your equipment at Sundance, ride the ski lift up, then bike down. Single-ride lift tickets may be purchased as well as half or full days. If biking is not for you, just ride the lift to experience the incredible mountain scenery.

PROVO RIVER FLY FISHING-

The Provo River is ranked one of America's Top 10 fly-fishing streams. Guide services can be arranged for several hours, half days or full days. The Provo River offers a premier blue ribbon trout fishery. Brown and rainbow trout reach record lengths in the Provo River, with a typical fish running 17 inches or bigger. One of the largest fish caught on the Provo River was over 30 pounds. In some areas of the Provo River, 7,500 trout are found per square mile.

SCENIC ATTRACTIONS

TIMPANOGOS CAVE

NATIONAL MONUMENT- In American Fork Canyon on the north slope of Mt. Timpanogos are three limestone caverns connected by man-made tunnels. Guided cave visits are conducted by park rangers on a half-mile tour lasting about one hour. Up to 20 people can be accommodated in one tour group.

To reach the cave, visitors must hike 1.5 miles on a hard-surfaced trail. A visitor center, a snack bar/gift shop, picnic areas, and nature trails are located at the base of the trail. The trail is open from approximately mid-May to mid-October. Tickets must be purchased at the visitor center before hiking to the cave. In summer, all tours usually sell out by early afternoon, so advance reservations are recommended, especially for groups. The Timpanogos Cave Visitor Center's hours of operation are 7:00am to 5:30pm, 7 days a week.

BRIDAL VEIL FALLS- One of Utah's most recognizable landmarks, Bridal Veil Falls is located just four miles up Provo Canyon (Hwy 189) from Provo and Orem. Double cataract waterfalls drop 607 feet. The falls can be seen from a scenic highway pull-out or from the Provo River below. The falls and the surrounding area are great for summer hiking. In the winter, an icefall just to the right of the falls makes the area a favorite for ice climbers world-wide.

UINTA NATIONAL FOREST-

Uinta National Forest offers camping, rock-climbing, ice-climbing, skiing, hunting, fishing, swimming, river-rafting, boating, snow-mobiling, and more. The forest can be accessed through American Fork, Provo, Hobbie Creek, Spanish Fork, and Payson Canyons. Some of Utah's finest scenic backways and byways weave through the forest, offering stunning vistas of alpine peaks and aspen-rimmed mountain meadows. Hiking and mountain-biking enthusiasts are afforded terrific views throughout the forest.

SCENIC DRIVES**NEBO LOOP SCENIC BYWAY**

(Forest Service Road 015)- Climbing to over 9,000 feet in elevation, this drive provides panoramic views of Utah Valley, the Wasatch Mountains, and 11,877-foot Mt. Nebo, the tallest mountain in the Wasatch Range. The area is characterized by scenic overlooks, hunting and fishing, abundant wildlife, campgrounds, and trails. The brilliant fall foliage of this scenic drive is unique. Several highlights include the Devil's Kitchen Geological Site, Mount Nebo Wilderness Area, and Payson Lakes Recreation Area. The loop can be accessed from Payson at I-15 exit #250 or Nephi at I-15 exit #225 to Highway 132. The trip is 32 miles (approximately 1½ hours). The road is closed during the winter. Contact the Uinta National Forest (801) 798-3571 for road conditions and further information.

PROVO CANYON SCENIC

BYWAY (US-189 from Provo to Heber City)- Between the towns of Heber City and Provo are natural wonders ranging from high mountain peaks to lush valley meadows. This scenic byway parallels the Provo River, one of Utah's popular fly fishing streams, as it winds through the rugged rock formations of Provo Canyon. Campgrounds and picnic areas can be found along the river. Some of this drive's highlights include Bridal Veil Falls, The Heber Valley Historic Railroad, and Deer Creek Reservoir. The drive provides access to another favorite backway, the Alpine Scenic Loop. This is also a great alternative route to Park City and Salt Lake City. To access the byway from Provo, go north on US Highway 189. The trip is 32 miles (approximately 45 minutes) and is open year round.

ALPINE LOOP SCENIC

BACKWAY (State Road 92)- In the shadow of 11,800-foot Mt. Timpanogos, this Utah favorite affords access to the Timpanogos and Lone Peak Wilderness Areas. This backway is a paved, two-lane road. Because of the steep grade and narrow curves, pulling trailers is prohibited. American Fork Canyon, on the northwestern end, features towering rock formations, picnic areas, and campgrounds. Some highlights of the trip include Sundance Resort, the Cascade Springs Scenic Backway, the Timpanogos Wilderness Area, and the Timpanogos Cave National Monument. Access the backway through the mouth of American Fork Canyon (I-15 exit #284 to Utah Road 92), or from Provo Canyon (US-189). The trip is 24 miles (approximately 1 hour). Contact the Utah Department of Transportation (801) 227-8000 for road conditions and further information. Day use- \$6.

CASCADE SPRINGS SCENIC

BACKWAY- Beginning at the Alpine Loop Scenic Backway (Utah Road 92) summit, between American Fork and Provo Canyons, this road affords views of Mt. Timpanogos, the Wasatch Mountains, and the distant High Uintas. This trip is famous for the large natural springs cascading down the mountain slope in a series of limestone terraces and pools. A barrier-free boardwalk criss-crosses the streams and pools offering excellent views of fish and aquatic plant life. Interpretive information is available along the trail. To access this backway, enter from the summit of Utah Road 92 (Alpine Scenic Loop). The trip is 25 miles long (approximately 1 hour). It is closed in the winter. Contact the Uinta National Forest (801) 785-3563 for road conditions and further information.

PONY EXPRESS TRAIL NATIONAL BACK COUNTRY

BYWAY- Visitors can enjoy a 133-mile stretch of the original Pony Express Route from Fairfield, Utah, to Ibapah, Utah. It begins at the Stagecoach Inn State Park and is marked with the monuments or ruins of 14 Pony Express Station sites. To access the route, begin at Stagecoach Inn State Park at 18053 W. 1540 N. in Fairfield (Southwest of Lehi on State Road 73). The byway is 133 miles (approximately 5-6 hours), open year round. The first 5 and last 2 miles are asphalt, the remaining surface is maintained gravel and dirt. Four-wheel-drive vehicles with chains, tow rope, or winch are recommended after heavy rain or snow. GROUP ACTIVITIES

THANKSGIVING POINT- No trip would be complete without a visit to Thanksgiving Point, Lehi's first stop for entertainment. At Thanksgiving Point there is truly something for everyone, with exciting attractions that include 15 different themed gardens spanning 55-acres, the world's largest dinosaur museum, a petting zoo, a Johnny Miller-designed golf course, shops, restaurants, and more. To get there form I-15, take exit 284 (Highland/Alpine) and go west.

NORTH AMERICAN MUSEUM OF ANCIENT LIFE - Located at beautiful Thanksgiving Point, this 120,000 square foot museum includes a giant-screen theater, cafe, gift shop, and special exhibit gallery. The Museum has more dinosaur skeletal displays than any other museum in the world, including a Utahraptor, a T-rex battle, and the over 100-foot-long Supersaurus. Hundreds of fossils, dozens of flying reptile displays, and over 50 interactive exhibits round out the Museum's offerings.

TRAFALGA! FAMILY FUN

CENTER- Trafalga is opened year-round and offers entertainment for all ages. Activities include miniature golf (1 indoor, 2 outdoor courses), arcade games, Little Indy Racers Slick Track, and batting cages. A pavilion with built-in barbeque facilities seats 100 people. Group rates are available.

SEVEN PEAKS WATER PARK -

Seven Peaks Water Park is Utah's largest water park, with 26 heated attractions. Seven Peaks boasts the largest wave pool in Utah, with seven wave patterns. The highest tower in Utah features nine water slides descending in every direction. The park has excellent group facilities and a visitor-friendly staff.

MUSEUMS

JOHN HUTCHINGS MUSEUM OF NATURAL HISTORY-

This unique museum was founded by John Hutchings whose lifelong interests included geology, art, Western history, and anthropology. The minerals on display comprise one of the most complete private collections in the U.S., now including a seismograph and other attractions. Fossil specimens range from Pre-Cambrian to Modern Age and have been loaned to such institutions as the Smithsonian and the New York American Museum of Natural History. Rare artifacts from Utah's prehistoric Native Americans—the Anasazi and Fremont Indians—are on display, as well as artifacts from the region's early pioneer history. The collections are rounded out with paintings and sculpture by or about Utahns. Guided tours are available.

SPRINGVILLE MUSEUM OF ART-

Located in Springville, Utah's "Art City," this nationally-recognized collection is housed in Utah's oldest museum for the visual arts. Selections from the Museum's permanent collection of over 2,000 works of American art include pieces that depict Utah's pioneer history. Four main-floor galleries display temporary exhibitions offering a wide variety of styles and media dealing with historical and contemporary art of Utah. A little-known treasure is the museum's collection of Soviet working class impressionism. Guided tours are available.

BYU MUSEUM OF PEOPLES AND CULTURES-

This museum displays anthropological artifacts from various cultures around the world—predominately prehistoric Utah, the American Southwest, Mesoamerica, and Polynesia. Some collections originate from 50,000 years ago. The Museum offers guided tours by appointment September through May.

BYU MUSEUM OF PALEONTOLOGY-

Dinosaur lovers of all ages will love this Brigham Young University museum. Tours, lectures, and a gift shop highlight one of the nation's most extensive fossil collections. The Earth Science Museum collection features ice-age mammals and ancient forms of sea life, as well as dinosaurs and dinosaur skin impressions. Regular exhibits include two fully-mounted, life-size Camptosaurus and Allosaurus skeletons, a 150 million-year old Jurassic dinosaur egg, and more.
